Course Description

he idea of modern Mexico is a cacophony of dissonant images: packed tourist resorts, the mind numbing violence of the drug war, a resurgent Mexico City, maquiladoras along the border, indigenous groups still struggling for reconciliation, the obscene wealth of Carlos Slim, and a middle class struggling to keep up in a globalized world. But how did modern Mexico come to be as we know it today? This class will trace the modernization of 20th Mexico through its cultural production (primarily literature), from the time of Porfirio Díaz through the nation-building project, from the onda of the 1960s to the recent protests over the 2015 disappearance of the 43 students of Ayotzinapa.

Course Objectives

ou will come away from the class with not only a good reading of 20th century Mexican literature, but also a strong understanding of the fundamental forces that shaped (and continue to shape) the development of the nation as a whole. In the process, you will improve writing and reading skills in Spanish, as well as further develop presentation skills.

Course Components

Attendance and Participa**tion:** Attendance and participation is a **must** in this class. I permit three unexcused absences, after that, 2% will be deducted per absence. It adds up quickly. Certain absences will be excused, including university events that require student attendance (ie - sports), medical reasons and family emergencies with documented excuse. Participation is key in this class. While reading, I recommend taking extensive notes not only to remember plotpoints, etc., but also interesting passages/points/emergent themes that you'd like to discuss in class. This will aid greatly in discussion and building ideas later on to explore in papers or essays.

In class presentations: Over the course of the semester you will do two presentations, one on a theme, and one on an article. Theme presentations are meant to give greater understanding/context to what we are doing that day, and

are generally fact-based. For article presentations, you will review the article for the class, laying out its arguments, etc. Finally, you will give a critical assessment of the article itself (strengths, weaknesses, overall), and then provide a couple of questions to help launch that day's discussion. Both presentations are worth 10% each and should be 10 minutes in length.

Response Papers: At different points in the semester, you will hand me a 1p response paper that explores thoughts/perspectives you had on that day's readings. It can be: a connection you made between a presentation and a reading, an off shoot of a comment in class, or anything else that's connected to the reading itself. These are great ways to develop a stable of ideas for the final presentation/essay, or conservation starters in

class. There are no specific due dates - pass them in when you feel inspired, but be sure to pace yourself as I will not accept more than one response per reading. 4 responses total x 2% each.

Research Presentation: On the last day of the semester we will present our research (final essay) topics in the form of 10 minute presentations done on Powerpoint/Prezi/similar. For this reason, it is of the utmost importance to develop an idea within a reasonable amount of time during the semester. You will be graded based upon the intelligibility of your presentation and how you handle any questions or comments you may receive.

Mid-Term Exam: Roughly one-hour in length, it will test upon what we've done until that point. More details to come closer to the exam date.

Final essay: As with any other essay, you will pick a theme (or themes) in one work (or several) and explore them with a well-defined thesis statement. Hopefully, the 5 response papers will give you a running start. 1500-1800 words with at least 5 academic sources.

Submitting Work: We will do some work on paper, and other work online. I will specify in-class how I would like each assignment submitted. Late work is generally not ac-
