## **Course Description**

The popularity of young adult literature has exploded in recent years, and novels such as *I'm Not Your Perfect Mexican Daughter* have claimed a seat for Latinos at this very lucrative table. But *Perfect* was hardly the first—Latinx literature has long dabbled in YA, with its two all-time best sellers (*Mango Street* and *Bless Me Última*) falling into this category. In this class we examine what this literature tells us about growing up Latino in the United States. We will also consider YA as a phenomenon in itself, both reflected in academia (where it is *finally* considered as worthy of study), and how it is positioned in the broader literary vis-a-vis against more "illustrious" genres.

### **Course Objectives**

By the end of this course, students will:

- Be familiar with defining characteristics of YA literature
- Be able to argue for/against the "seriousness" of certain genres
- Learn critical concepts to enable deeper analysis
- Develop critical thinking skills, demonstrated through thesis-driven essays
- Develop necessary skills to explore a topic both in writing and through oral presentations
- Be familiar with key issues facing Latinos in the United States

As a First Year Seminar, this class also aims to develop broader skills that will help you in your university career. These include:

- Accessing resources in order to do research
- Properly citing sources and avoiding plagiarism/honor code violations
- Developing public speaking and presentation skills



#### Participation & Attendance:

Attendance and participation is a **must** in this class. Participation is not merely sitting there—you must actively speak! While reading, I recommend taking extensive notes not only to remember plotpoints, etc., but also interesting passages/points/emergent themes that you'd like to discuss in class.

Quizzes: In order to verify that you've done the readings, I will give a number of in-class quizzes on covered content. Since I will drop the lowest grade, there will be no makeups.

Written Reflections: These are an ongoing discussion (with yourself) that will hopefully show how your reasoning has evolved over the semester. These are also a great place to jot down ideas from readings to organize your thoughts for in-class discussions and essays.

**Presentation:** In front of the class, you will present a topic that covers an issue connected to Latinos in the United States. Should be 6-8 minutes in length. Depth and precision are key.

**Essays:** Over the course of the semester, you will produce three essays in varying length, focusing on (1) literary analysis, (2) compare and contrast, and (3) argument. You will combine the readings with writing skills that we will develop to show how you have progressed.

Final Project: After reading a semester's worth of Young Adult literature, surely you have some ideas of your own! It's time to get creative. In a roughly 2000 word short story, you will do just that.

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**Mid-term Grades:** Will be determined by work completed to that point in the semester. Because of that, it may be more heavily weighted towards some of the above categories than others.
